The meeting convened at 9:35 AM.

1. Introductions

K. Diers welcomed everyone and noted that the committee chair was unable to attend the meeting. Seeing no objections, B. Frost volunteered to serve as chair pro tempore.

Committee members were joined around the table for a round table discussion with state elected leaders. All went around the room and introduced themselves.

2. Project Overview

J. Czysz gave a brief overview of the project and status to date. A full copy of the presentation is included at the end of the meeting notes along with a copy of two handouts: an overview of the

Regional Online Forum and Regional Plan Framework. Also distributed was a copy of the Granite State Future Frequently Asked Questions, available online.

3. Presentation of Public Outreach Tools

J. Czysz demonstrated the opportunities for State Legislators to collect input from their constituents via two online public input tools developed by the Regional Planning Commission for the purpose of collecting input into the regional plans.

<u>"Share Your Ideas!" Online Database:</u> The "Share Your Ideas!" data base is accessible from the Granite State Future home page (<u>www.granitestatefuture.org</u>) and allows users to respond to two questions: What do you like best about this area? And, What could be better? All comments are attributed to a municipality and region and can be queried by any visitors to the website by town or key word. Knowing that not all people would be inclined to respond to an online survey, the RPC staff also attended as many events as they could in the region and collected additional responses via comment cards that were manually entered into the online database.

<u>Regional Online Forums</u>: As noted above, a summary of the Regional Online Forums distributed at the meeting is included at the end of the meeting notes. J. Czysz demonstrated how users can place a pin anywhere on the map, add a comment or idea, vote on existing ideas, or propose alternative suggestions. There is a complimentary topic based component to the map based portion of the forum for non-place based comments.

4. Roundtable Discussion, Public Comments, and Questions

B. Frost introduced three questions that the RPCs would specifically like to discuss and solicit feedback from State Legislators. These included:

- a. What would you, as elected leaders, like to learn from the regional plans?
- b. What are important issues you see in your region or community?
- c. Where do you see opportunities for collaboration?

Much of the conversation was centered upon responding to fundamental questions about the RPCs scope of work and funding, and was similar in nature to the Granite State Future Frequently Asked Questions that is available <u>online</u>. The following is a summary of responses received during the conversation.

What would you like to learn from the regional plans?

- Telecommunications, broadband important for our economy to expand
- Health care a regional endeavor, often too large for an individual community to take on (hospitals)
- Sustainability has different definitions for all
- Make sure that the plans are balance and represent all voices
- Real time sharing of data with state agencies as it's collected be proactive in sharing data
- How can communities find common issues and opportunities where there may be regional impacts from growth

What are important issues you see in your region or community?

- Prepare for growth pressures
- Vitality of the airport

Access to Route 3 and 93

Where do you see opportunities for collaboration?

- Forums for communication
- Continued opportunities for discussions and input

Other Concerns:

- Were there Federal strings from HUD-EPA-DOT?
- "Sustainability" as a term concerns much of the public
- Concerned about water sustainability commission
- Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing what are the implications to municipalities?


























GRANITE STATE FUTURE The Online Forum

This is an interactive mapping tool where you can share what you value about your community, or what might make it better. Leave comments for others to vote on, and/or comment and vote on what is already there. It is very important that you **zoom** in to the area that you want to comment on.

TO ACCESS THE FORUM

- Visit granitestatefuture.org/regions
- Select your region
- Click the Green Button:

Enter your zip code

PLACE A VIRTUAL PIN ON THE MAP

- Tell us what is important to you in the region and why.
- What are your favorite places?
- What places do you think are important?
- What kinds of improvements are needed?



Enter as many locations on the map as you want. Search the map, zoom to your community, use Google Maps and Street View to explore the region. (Note: You cannot place pins while in Street View.)

COMMENT ON REGIONAL TOPICS

Share your thoughts and opinions about important topics affecting your community, your family, your friends and neighbors.

VOTE AND RESPOND TO OTHERS

The Forum has been designed for you to respond to what others have entered. You can vote (once per comment) and add your own comments. Visit the Regional Forum as many times as you like to check in and see what others are talking about.

PARTICIPATION

When you first enter the Regional Forum you will be asked your Zip Code. If you are interested in learning more or want to receive updates on the project you are invited to share your e-mail address. We will never post your e-mail address with your comment, send you unsolicited e-mails, or sell your email address to third parties.

COMMENT REVIEW AND SCREENING

All comments will be screened for spam or inappropriate content.

GRANITE STATE FUTURE Regional Plan Framework

Granite State Future's Technical Advisory Subcommittees (TASCs), made up of transportation, housing, water, economic development, natural resources and other infrastructure professionals, used the NH Livability Principles as a framework to discuss and compile the many resources in NH; policies, recommendations, and

questions that regional plans should consider; existing conditions and trends; and a variety of metrics for measuring progress.
